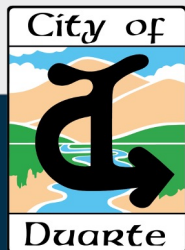


Pathway Home

What is Pathway Home

- After declaring a state of emergency on homelessness in January 2023, the Board of Supervisors authorized efforts to streamline hiring, contracting, purchasing, grants, and real estate processes.
- Pathway Home has also been made possible by Measure H, a voter-approved ¼-cent sales tax.



What is Pathway Home

- Pathway Home begins with outreach teams developing trusting relationships with people at an encampment, helping them get treatment for immediate medical needs, and offering them immediate and diverse options for interim housing, including partnerships with partner hotels.
- Once at interim housing, participants receive supportive services such as on-site case management and connections to physical and mental healthcare, substance use disorder treatment, benefits enrollment, life skills development, and more.
- To facilitate their transition to permanent housing, the County will connect them with housing navigation to help them throughout the lease-up process and time-limited subsidies for individuals whose income is insufficient to cover the rent. Once permanently housed in their own apartment, they can continue to receive supportive services.



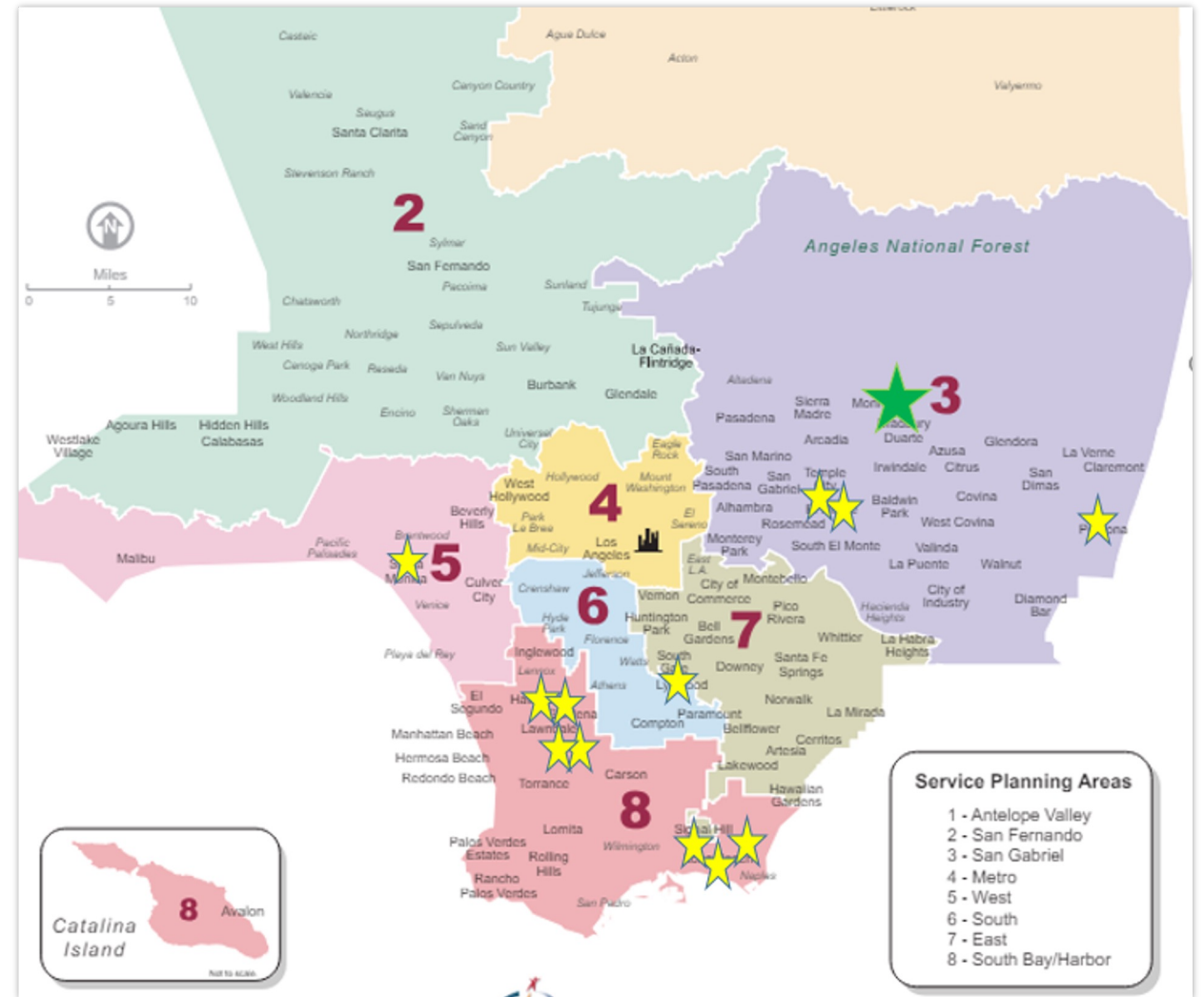
What is Pathway Home

- The Pathway Home program is overseen by the Los Angeles County Chief Executive Office (CEO) and was formally launched on August 9, 2023.
- The CEO directly enters into a lease agreement with hotel/motel owners and works closely with cities to identify candidates within the city to be housed.
- The site provides 24/7 wrap around services, on site nursing services, and private security.

What It Is Not

- A Permanent Shelter
- No Walk in Services
- Not a means to transport individuals from out of the area
- Not a means to end homelessness



Issues Affecting the City

City of Duarte Regularly Responds to Call of Encampments

- County Library, Big Lots Shopping Center, Grocery Outlet Shopping Center, Target Shopping Center, Teen Center, Senior Center, Duarte Park, Aloysia Moore Park, Andres Duarte Plaza.
- In Cities with a Pathway Home Program - Partner Agencies are Reporting a Reduction in Calls for Service Related to Encampments.
- The City of Duarte's Homeless Plan Centers Around Outreach Services. The Goal has been to Establish Shelter Beds.



Why This Location - Quality Inn 1125 E. Huntington Drive, Monrovia

- CEO's Office reached out to every hotel/motel in the area
- This location is the only location that was willing to participate for two reasons:
- Ending their contract with Quality Inn and looking to rebrand
- This program offered wrap around services



Commitment by Monrovia/Duarte

- To work with the CEO's Office and Volunteers of America throughout the entire program
- To enforce all violations of the law that occur on the sidewalk in front of or near the location
- To work with neighboring businesses and residents to resolve any issues immediately



Who This Program Will Serve

Rebecca, Female (50-55)

- a. Had home in the city, former worker of DUSD
- b. Known hang out Duarte Park - on the streets 20+ years

Otis, Male (60-65)

- a. Had home in the city, has family in city
- b. Big Lots Area - on the streets 15+ years

Ashley, Female (30-35)

- a. Family in the city
- b. 210 underpass on Buena Vista- on the streets 10+ years

Vivian, Female (70-75)

- a. Had home in the city
- b. Duarte park - on the streets 10+ years

Jimmy, Male (50-55)

- a. Had home in the city
- b. Duarte park - on the streets 10+ years

Aquainette, Female (45-50)

- a. Long time transient in city, no family connection
- b. Big lots area- on the streets 20+ years

Edward "Eddie", male (40-45)

- a. Had family in city, moved away
- b. Buena Vista and Huntington corridor - on the streets 15+ years

Donald, Male (45-50)

- a. No known connection to Duarte
- b. Duarte Park - on the streets 15+ years

Byron, Male (30-35)

- a. Family within the City
- b. Duarte Park - on the streets 10+ years

April, Female (35-40)

- a. Family in the city
- b. Buena Vista and Huntington corridor - on the streets 10+ years
